

Making an impact on campus and in the community




In 2009, Fr. John Schlegel signed the American College and University Presidents' Climate Commitment (ACUPCC) on behalf of Creighton University. The university pledges to:

- Complete an emissions inventory
- Develop a Climate Action Plan:
 - Set target date for climate neutrality
 - Determine interim milestones
- Integrate sustainability into the educational curriculum
- Make the action plan, inventory, and progress reports public

The Climate Action Plan, finalized in 2013, lists concrete steps to reduce the university's greenhouse gas emissions to zero by 2050, with a 40% reduction by 2028, the sesquicentennial of the university.



Over 40,000 pounds of materials were donated to Goodwill from 9 residence halls in 2013.



Jesuits on sustainability


